

'SRI CHAKRA' PREDICTS YOUR FUTURE

INDIA, a land of mysteries and exotic mysticism has enchanted the world from days unknown. Tantras and yantras are closely associated with them.

Over the past few years, the papers have splashed news about a young man who shot into prominence since his startlingly accurate prediction regarding the assassination of the late Prime Minister, Indira "Gandhi".

Born to a freedom-fighter of the Kambalatha Naicker family of zamindars from the Sidhargal Nattham Village renowned as the abode of 18 "Siddhars" on the banks of the river "Vaigai", R.K. Sennaya Swami (Sri Chakras) Muthukrishnan stumbled on an extraordinary phenomenon - the art of predicting future through the 'Sri Chakra'.

The Sri Chakra is basically a symmetrical arrangement of triangles and circles, with lotus petals forming the borders of the circles.

It comprises of geometric diagrams with each element symbolising various aspects of cosmogenic and psycho-physical views of Tantrism.

The Sri Chakra indicates the eight directions, also seen as the eight protecting deities of the community (see diagram). The eight apexes in the diagram represent the eight deities such as Vayu (air), Varuna (water), Agni (Fire), Yama (death), Kubera (wealth) and so on, which are the basic elements surrounding man.

FOCAL POINT

The lotus petals indicate the spreading and unfolding of the aspiration of the devotee. When he finds the truth, the lotus folds back and the concentration is on a point, representing the basic principle, the truth. This focal point, the centre from which everything emanates, is represented in the Sri Chakra as the 'Bindu' (dot).

The Bindu symbolises Adiparasakthi which, in the Hindu mythology, is shown as being Durga (Valour), Lakshmi (wealth) and Saraswathi (wisdom).

The chakra has both the male and the female aspects of the living world. The triangle standing on the base is the male principle while that standing on the apex is the female. When the two come together, there is creation - the two combined denotes activity, energy, stability and continuity.



Apart from this, the chakra drawn as per the rules laid down by tradition is supposed to have magic powers. When accompanied by the chanting of the appropriate mantras, the devotee, under deep concentration, derives extraordinary powers.

The Sri Chakra has been a puzzle and an attraction to the scholars, in the West. John Woodroffe, a British Scholar, J. Bolton and D. Nicol, British researchers; Heinrich Zemmier, the German Indologist; Kulaichev, Russian researcher and many others.

"Intuition has led me to foresee the future through the shapes and angles of the triangles, but I wish scientists and Hindu scholars would probe deeper into the mystical chakra and see if they can arrive at the real answer," says Muthukrishnan.

In an exclusive interview with GUIDE INDIA, he shares a few nostalgic moments.

Looking on with earnest desire to get his message across, Muthukrishnan speaks enthusiastically on the subject dear to his heart.

TURNING POINT

Startling though it seems, this simple young man, so far removed from modern living, moved to Coimbatore to do the draftsman's course. This introduced him to lines and angles and spurred him to work on triangles, their properties and the significant relationship among a group of triangles placed in a particular order.

When asked how he first came across the Sri Chakra, he explained that it was just by accident.

"I was sitting inside the Kapaleeshwarar temple in Madras when I saw a piece of paper from "The Hindu" flutter by. I picked it up and found to my surprise a diagram with triangles arranged in a set pattern. It was a report on the research done by a Russian, Kulaichev, on the Sri Chakra".

"I wrote to him explaining my interest and from then on our communication has been strong."

Clad in 'Kurta Pyjama', he goes about his business with a nonchalance that is catching. Muthukrishnan's first prediction came soon after the temple incident. He wrote to the then Prime Minister, Mrs Indira Gandhi's office regarding his research and was given a green signal to carry on. His prediction about her assassination created a big

stir.

Soon followed alarmingly accurate predictions about the assassination of Rajiv Gandhi.

He also said that though Rajiv would win the elections in 1991, he did not see him as India's next Prime Minister. True enough, Congress (I) won but Rajiv was not the PM. Surprisingly, Muthukrishnan was the only one to predict his death.

Over the years, people from all walks of life have thronged his doorstep to find out what their future holds in store for them, but Muthukrishnan remembers very clearly three personalities he had met. They neither belong to the elite class nor are they men of wealth or of sound standing. One was a ruffian who tried to waylay the fragile man and who turned out to predict his future.

Muthukrishnan recalls vividly the words said by the ruffian after hearing him relate incidents that were to happen to him.

"I see the world through your eyes".

"This sentence has moved me like nothing else. They were said with deepest feelings and open mind."

The other two are the Paramacharya of Kancheepuram and the Shringeri Pectam Bharathi Swamiji.

"All the three had nothing to gain from my predictions: that is what makes them unique," he says.

FUTURE PLANS

When asked about his future plans, he replied: "I have covered 60 per cent of the research, but there is still a long way to go. For instance, I read a book written by Engels in which he has equated mathematics with solids, liquids, physics, and chemistry as having some kind of relationship but while talking of biology, he says: "Biology = 0 : Engels, in his book, "Dialectics of Nature," states in these terms: Application of mathematics: in the mechanics of solid bodies it is absolute, in that of gases approximate, in that of fluids already more difficult; in physics more tentative and relative; in chemistry, simple equations of the first order

and of the simplest nature; in biology = 0. I am puzzled, mainly because my prediction on humans actually depends on numbers. I'm working on the theory. I also have plans to visit Egypt and see the pyramids.

"I am curious to know as to why the Egyptians chose the triangle as the shape for their pyramids. Why not a square, a rectangle or even a semicircle, a dome-like

structure for instance, and why provide for airholes for the dead? This is going to be my main area of research in the near future," he says animatedly.

Now we moved on to a very interesting question -- what does he foresee for India during 1994? He has predicted that India will face a lot of internal disturbances, but taking the Ashok Chakra into consideration, he sees good leadership. "Many people will try to separate India but they will not succeed. Only when there is no Diwali, no Sankranti, will India break; but as has always happened in the past, every time a major threat comes our way, the Indians as a whole will rise to the occasion and stand as a

the pages of magazines and newspapers. Yet there is something missing. Why do you think it is so? What is essentially missing in them?

A: The media has taken the role of a teacher who says: "This is this... that is that... The commoners like students, take it and digest it, accepting the messages as facts, but if they were to stand up and ask: "WHY is this and WHY is that, they will then begin an avalanche of revolutionary answers.

The media has become the means through which the latest event is introduced to the masses, not educate them.

Publicity has become the keyword in today's world. Yes, it helps. For instance, the Jain temple of Chanda Prabhu was relatively unknown. The plight of the priest and his two sons spurred me to suggest the same name for the biggest vegetarian village, in the world, Chandaa Prabhu, with an extra 'a' in it. The media gave it enough publicity and I am happy the temple is in a better condition since then."

The frail, young man stuck a note never touched before.

His simplicity and an honest approach to issues have made him very popular.

Dr K. Venkatasubramanian, former Vice-Chancellor of Central University, Pondicherry, has hailed him as "a mathematical genius like our Srinivasa Ramanujan".
